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1.0 GENERAL INFORMATION & GUIDELINES

1. Objectives of the IDP:
 - a) Clearly defines the vision and mission of the institution.
 - b) Identification of goals, priorities and commitments of the institution based on the SWOR and need assessment.
 - c) Quantification of the institution's goals using indicators and time-bound targets.
 - d) Based on goals and priorities and available capacity (human and financial) listing out steps for bridging the organizational gaps.
 - e) Development of annual activity plans which result, sequentially, in achieving the institution's goals. These activity plans will also serve as a tool for monitoring the implementation of the IDP.
2. The IDP will be prepared for a period of five years, and contain a description of measures for sustainably beyond this period as per methodology given at sec 5.
3. The IDP will be a living document, evolving as the strategic planning capacity of the institution increases. The indicators and targets, however, will be agreed in an agreement between the AGU/HO and the institution. These can only be amended with the HO consent.
4. The section 2 titled 'Baseline Data' specifies the sources of data to be used for each table. Data on any variable contained in these tables shall be drawn from the same source when it appears in any other part of the IDP.
5. IDP Development Steps:
 - a) Identify the Coordinator in charge of developing the IDP and form a task force with assigned responsibilities.
 - b) Obtain inputs from all the Department Heads/Deans.
 - c) Carry out SWOR analysis and needs assessment, documenting the consultations held and the conclusions and recommendations reached.
 - d) List out needs arising from AGU directives, Regulatory bodies constraints and specific priority of the University.
 - e) Based on the needs assessment, identify the goals, priorities and commitments of the institution and revisit Vision and Mission and revise them if needed.
 - f) Draft an initial version of the IDP including indicators and time-bound targets as per methodology given at section 5.
 - g) Share the initial draft of the IDP for consultations with all stakeholders.
 - h) Finalise the IDP, based on the comments received as per the template suggested at section 6 and 7.
 - i) Prepare an executive summary
 - j) Identify the activities required to achieve the goals stated in the IDP and incorporate them into annual activity plans.
 - k) Use check list template at section 6.4 for keeping a record of Qualitative development during

the IDP Period.

- l) At end of every year document achievement against plan and revise based on over flow.
- m) At any given time in implementation of plan record of achievement against plan with reason for short fall be documented. Check list at section 6.4 be annexed to this documents.

The institution will be responsible for reporting to the AGU on IDP implementation and progress against targets, based on timelines and formats prescribed by AGU as per format suggested at (m) above.

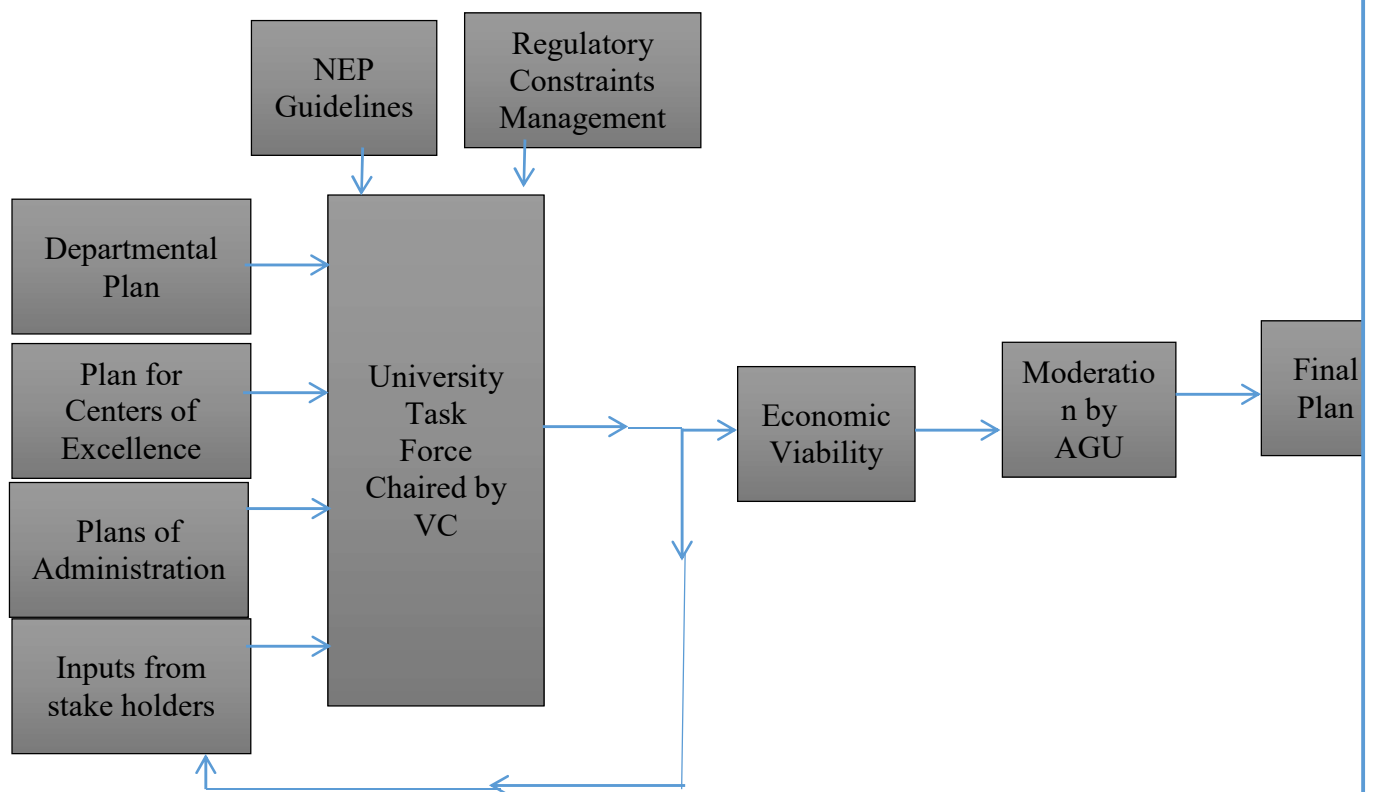

6.5 Flagship Programm:

Level of Admissions: B. Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture; M. Sc. Agri. (Seed Science and Technology)

Quality of Students: Almost all the Students are from rural area, so we are trying to develop their agricultural skills and acquaint them with agricultural tools through different activities. We are trying to improve the quality of the students.

Fees Structure: UG (B. Sc. Hons. Agriculture): Rs. 36000/- Per Year

PG (M. Sc. Agri. Seed Science and Technology): Rs. 36000/-Per Year

Infrastructure:

1. We have laboratory with some apparatus and trying to enrich the laboratory with more required apparatus.
2. We have sufficient agricultural field for practical activities.

Teaching Learning Quality: We are planning for providing consultancy services very soon and applying for projects. Our department use numerous cross-disciplinary theories and techniques to explain the subject, through which we are trying to improve the quality of teaching.

Revision/ New Courses and Programmes:

We are planning to introduce B.Sc. (Horticulture), B.Sc. (Biotechnology), B.Sc. (Food Technology), M.Sc. (Agri. Horticulture), M.Sc. (Agri. Plant Breeding) M.Sc. (Biotechnology), and M.Sc. (Food Technology).

Attendance: The attendance of UG and PG classes lies between 80 to 95%.

Projects/Consultancy/Research: The department has completed 2 projects and planning for more projects.

Publication: Yet the faculty of Agriculture have published about 38 research papers in National/International Journals. The department made compulsory to its faculty to publish at least 2 research paper in a year.

Value-added courses: Yet we have no Value added courses for the UG student of Agriculture but we are planning to provide value added courses.

Level of Apprenticeship: The department used to send students for apprenticeship in various industries to learn post-harvest techniques, food-processing, mushroom production and marketing practices of various agricultural products.

Level of Internship: Generally we send our students to KVKs and ATMA for internship.

Any Special Project: The department will initiate a facility for crop improvement molecular plant pathology and biotechnology.

Results: The UG student's results – 100%.

The PG student's results – 100%.

Placement: Due to lack of Training and Placement officer in the University the placement procedure is very slow.

Alumni Activity: Yet we have no Alumni Association.

Industry collaboration: We work closely with our industry partners with the objective of adding value and placing our students. Recently, we have signed one memorandum of understanding (MOU) with an agriculture-based business, Synergy Techno fin, which works towards the upliftment of rural livelihood.
